But perhaps the most worrying fact is that Donald Trump arrives at the White House with a peacemaker speech with Moscow or if we want, with an appetency to test (again) the dialogue and the negotiations at the green table with Vladimir Putin, slicing peace through concessions and transactions on behalf of the so called "vital interests" of the major players in an unprecedented openness to bilateral trade fairs. This may mean distance of both sides of the

Atlantic, and a collapse of the traditionally Euro-Atlanticism, a resettlement of the balance of forces with a major footprint rebalancing of investments in security and defense for Europe and individual allies and the readjustment of advantages and benefits of US in such investments abroad. A perspective at all encouraging for today's politics.

Meanwhile let's not stay stuck on the past and like Mahatma Gandhi said "The future depends on what you do today." so let's go and do something so we can have a bright future.

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
